



BRINGING YOUR PET TO GUATEMALA

- You must first take your pet to a U.S. registered veterinarian for a health certificate stating that the pet has been examined, shows no evidence of communicable disease, and has been vaccinated for rabies, distemper, hepatitis, leptospirosis, and parvovirus. The certificate must be executed within 30 days prior to the animal's entry into Guatemala. Not all U.S.-based veterinarians can perform certification, so be sure to check first that your veterinarian can provide or recommend someone for this service.
- Then take or mail the health certificate to the nearest office of the Department of Agriculture in the United States that approves health certificates for pets.
- After the certificate has been approved by the Department of Agriculture, you will need to have it authenticated by the Guatemalan Embassy or a Guatemalan Consulate in the United States.
